About the North Carolina Literary and Historical Association

On September 18, 1900, a group of men met in Raleigh to establish an organization to encourage literary and historical activity in North Carolina. The North Carolina Literary and Historical Association was founded, and its purposes were to "stimulate the production of literature in our state," and "to collect and preserve historical material." The Literary and Historical Association facilitated the founding of the agency that would later become the Office of Archives and History. Illustrious North Carolinians have let the organization through the years, including Justice Walter Clark; R.D.W. Connor, first archivist of the United States; and authors Paul Green and Inglis Fletcher.

About the Federation of North Carolina Historical Societies

The Office of Archives and History established the Federation of North Carolina Historical Societies in the 1970s as a statewide coalition of organizations, dedicated to working together to preserve and promote local history. The Federation continues to nurture a network of more than 100 member history organizations across the state through regular communications, workshops, and meetings. It offers mini-grants and interest-free loans, provides technical assistance, and supports the state's National History Day program.
