By Mrs. Garland Jones, a manuscript copy of the Farewell order of Gen. R. E. Lee, at Appomattox, April 10, 1865, copied at the time.

By Mrs. R. B. Peebles (Miss Margaret Cameron) a small box sent her from the army by Lt. Walker Anderson, of General Cook's staff, the contents being a lock of Gen. Lee's hair cut in the tent of Gen. Pettigrew, with his autograph card; a strand plucked from the tail of Gen. Lee's horse, Traveler, by Walker Anderson.

The bullet that killed the horse ridden by Gen. Pettigrew when he was captured before Richmond, taken out by Maj. Collins. A picture of Gen. Pettigrew sent by him to Miss Margaret Cameron.

Piece of the apple tree at Appomattox given Miss Cameron by Lieut. Gen. Hardee.

A button from the coat of a cadet of the Hillsboro Academy, killed near the end of the war near Goldsboro.

A button cut from the dress coat of Gen. Lee, by Mrs. Lee, and given by her to Miss Cameron.

A rosebud from the coat of Gen. Lee, given by him.

Souvenirs from Johnson's Island.

An autograph letter from Gen. Beauregard thanking Mrs. Paul C. Cameron and her daughters for some woolen shirts knit by them for him.

A confederate song book.

A flower from the bier of four Confederate soldiers buried by Rev. M. A. Curtis and Miss Cameron, with the aid of her father's servants, when Johnston's army was near Hillsboro.

Last letter written by Lt. Thomas Cowan, commanding Co. B, 3rd N. C. T., written on the day he was mortally wounded in the battle of Sharpsburg.

North Carolina Almanacs during the war, deposited by Henry D. Coley.

Sketch of Gov. Jonathan Worth, Treasurer of the State during the war, by his sister, Mrs. Moffitt.

Early Times in Raleigh, deposited by Maj. R. S. Tucker.

Confederate money, deposited by Mrs. Margaret Shipp.

Confederate flags, of the three designs adopted by the Confederate States government, and a battle flag, made by the ladies of the Monumental Association.
